



Upper School Profile

Randolph's Upper School is an engaging, challenging environment for students in 9th through 12th grade. We are proud of our rigorous academic program, wide-ranging extracurricular activities, nurturing environment, and culture of trust.

Our college counseling office consists of two Co-Directors and a Registrar/College Counseling Assistant. Rusty Allen has been at Randolph School for 21 years, and has been in college counseling for over 40 years total. Jessica Forinash just completed her second year at Randolph School, having worked previously in highly selective college admissions and in independent school counseling. Jenna Pirani serves as the Registrar and liaison to any universities wishing to visit our school. Starting in the junior year, all of our students meet regularly in group and individual sessions to understand the admissions process and how to find the right fit for their university experience. 45% of students in our last two graduating classes earned a composite score of 30 or higher on the ACT. Typically, 10% of the members of each graduating class are recognized as finalists, semifinalists, or commended scholars in the National Merit Scholarship competition. Virtually all graduates attend four-year colleges. 100% of our students who seek merit-based financial aid receive it.

In the most recent graduating class (2018) 64% have completed courses in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics and 60% have completed calculus. 28% have taken four years of foreign language at the Upper School level. 91% of graduates have completed at least one AP course, 65% have completed at least 3, and 20% have taken 6 or more.



In athletics, we have 26 varsity teams playing 15 sports. 70% of our Upper School students participate in at least one sport, 35% play more than one sport.



The Upper School presents two major theater productions a year, as well as band and choir concerts. We offer a multitude of visual arts courses. 83% of recent graduating classes have taken four years of visual or performing arts.



Community Learning in the Upper School is a broad invitation to all students that increases awareness, advocacy, and active service through Advisory, Service Days, Youth Leadership Council, individual student initiatives, and several clubs and teams that partner with community organizations.

Students value the student-led Honor System and participate in our advisory program. Guest speakers and student programs highlight our weekly Community Time. Finally, our students love the experiential learning opportunities provided each year during Interim week.

Randolph holds dual accreditation from SAIS/AdvancEd and is a member of the National, Southern and Alabama Associations of Independent Schools; the National and Southern Association of College and Admissions Counselors; The College Board; the National Honor Society; and the Cum Laude Society.




Interim Week gives students the opportunity for travel, service and/or career exploration. The 9th Grade travels each year to Chicago, and older students take a wide array of trips, shadow various careers, and pursue service opportunities both locally and globally.

Our Community Learning Program invites students to engage in meaningful service partnerships with community-based groups throughout North Alabama. Individuals, teams, groups, and classes form long-term relationships with local organizations like Village of Promise, the Boys and Girls Clubs of North Alabama, Manna House, and the North Alabama Land Trust. The Upper School devotes two days each year to community learning, and the program is coordinated by a student-led Youth Leadership Council.

The Randolph School Summer Internship Program is a one-month opportunity to gain real world experience working in a professional setting in local businesses, research institutions, and governmental agencies. Participation is competitive.
